University of Pennsylvania where she recently earned her Master's in Applied Positive Psychology.




Kevin Christopher Fox (Director/Sheriff Peters) Originally from Asheville, NC, Kevin is an actor/ director based in Chicago for the past 25 years. Chicago directing highlights: world premiere of *Assassination Theater* by Hillel Levin (Russell Lane, LLC); *Bakersfield Mist* and *Widowers' Houses* (TimeLine), the world premieres of *Graveyard of Empires* by Elaine Romero and *The Gun Show* by EM Lewis, and *Pull of the Moon, Accidental Rapture, & The Book Club Play* (16th StreetTheater), *Lay Me Down Softly* and *Hughie* (Irish Theatre of

Chicago, formally Seanachai Theatre Co.). Regional highlights: the world premieres of *The Spiritualist* by Robert Ford and *Sundown Town* by Kevin Cohea (TheatreSquared) and *The Actuary* by Steven Peterson (Peninsula Players).

artist, her work spans over 20 years and includes video games, commercial spots and audiobooks. She is the recipient of a 2019 3Arts Award, a member of The Chicago Inclusion Project, and a proud Guatemalan-American. Black Lives Matter!



Greg Vinkler (George Henderson) is delighted to have played a part in the Players' wonderful history for 31 years. Besides putting the seasons together, as well as the winter play reading series, he has directed 32 productions (including *Chicago*, *Lombardi* and *The Full Monty*) and performed in 51 shows. For his work with the Players, he was honored with the inaugural Door County Artist of the Year Award. Greg has performed extensively in Chicago, appearing at Chicago Shakespeare (39 productions), Goodman, Steppenwolf, Court, Writers, Northlight, Marriott Lincolnshire and Victory Gardens theaters, and has received three Joseph Jefferson Awards (12 nominations), two Artisan Awards and an After Dark

Award. Regionally he has performed at Milwaukee Rep, Paper Mill, Fulton, Pittsburgh Public and BoarsHead theaters. Greg appeared on Broadway in the Tony Award-winning revival of *West Side Story* and also at the Royal Shakespeare Company in Stratford-upon-Avon, the Barbican Theatre in London, Vienna's English Theatre and Singapore Rep.



Ele Matelan (Foley Artist) (She/Her/Hers) has designed, choreographed, and performed Foley for over 80 productions in Chicagoland with companies including Locked Into Vacancy Entertainment, Theatre of Western Springs, Lifeline Theatre, Oak Park Festival Theatre, Otherworld Theatre, The Second City Training Center, and WildClaw Theatre, where she serves as lead designer for Deathscribe, the annual international live horror radio festival. She has guest lectured on stage Foley at Northwestern University's School of Sound and at Harvard University's School of Music, and has consulted for theaters ranging from London, UK to Livonia, MI. She is also a featured voice actor on Hartlife NFP's Our Fair City and Unwell.



Christopher Kriz (Original Music) Christopher is a composer and sound designer based in Chicago. Previous Peninsula Players designs include: *Miss Holmes*, Salvage, *The Actuary, Peter and the Starcatcher, Alabama Story, The 39 Steps, Outside Mullingar, Lend Me A Tenor, Butler* and many others. Winner of four Joseph Jefferson Awards with a total of 19 nominations. Chicago credits: Goodman Theatre, Steppenwolf, Chicago Shakespeare, Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Remy Bumppo, Victory Gardens, First Folio, Timeline, The Gift Theatre, American Blues, and many others. Susan Glaspell (Playwright, (July 1, 1876 – July 28, 1948) Glaspell was a renowned American playwright, novelist, fiction writer and actor who along with her husband, George Cram Cook, founded the Provincetown Players, considered the first modern American theater company. In 1916, aspiring playwright Eugene O'Neil's first play, *Bound East for Cardiff*, was produced by Glaspell's company.

Glaspell was born and raised in Iowa, the middle child of a schoolteacher and a hay farmer. In 1893, the family sold the farm and moved to Davenport, where she excelled in school and

started writing for newspapers. At age 21, Glaspell entered Drake University, an unconventional move for a woman at the time, and graduated in 1899. As a newspaper reporter for *The Des Moines Daily News*, she again blazed trials for female reporters by covering court cases, murder and politics. Glaspell reported on a sensational murder case in rural Iowa and after the trial, she quit her job as a reporter to focus on her creative writing. In 1909, her first novel, "The Glory of the Conquered," was published and became a New York Times best-seller. Inspired by this murder case, she wrote the play *Trifles* in 1916 and in 1917 a short story entitled "A Jury of her Peers." Her body of work includes 15 plays, nine novels, numerous short stories and a biography of George Cook. Her play *Alison's House*, based on the life of Emily Dickinson, earned her the 1931 Pulitzer Prize for Drama.
